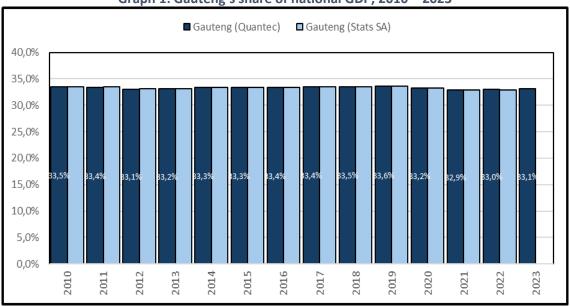

Provincial Review 2024: Gauteng

Gauteng is the most populous province in South Africa, with a rapidly growing population due to a large influx of internal migrants. It is also the largest economy in the country, although its growth has been declining over the years, with significant drops during economic crises. The real economy in Gauteng is dominated by the manufacturing sector, followed by construction, mining, and agriculture. Employment in the real economy has not reached pre-pandemic levels, although manufacturing remains the largest employer among real sectors. Overall, Gauteng enjoys better service provision than other provinces.

The real economy in Gauteng: structure and growth

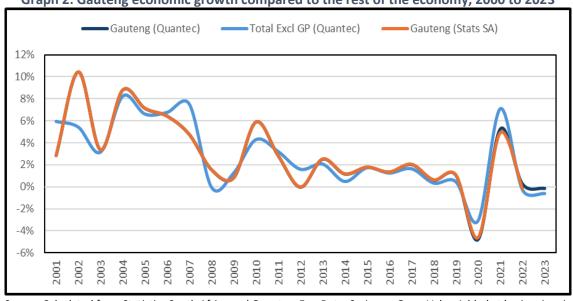
Gauteng is also the largest economy in the country, accounting for 33.1% of the national GDP in 2023. Notably, due to pandemic effects, the province's share of the national GDP has declined from its peak in the past decade of 33.6% in 2019 (see Graph 1).

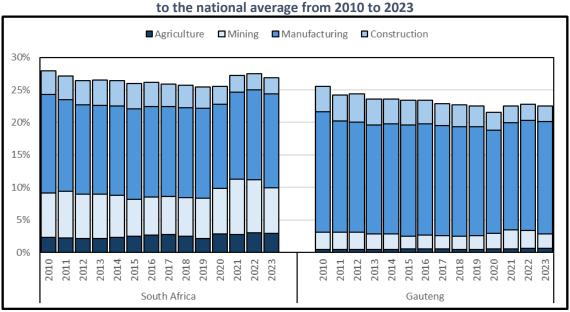
Although Gauteng remains the biggest economy, its growth performance has been on a terminal decline since 2005, with steeper declines from global shocks such as the 2008/9 global financial crisis and the COVID-19 pandemic (see Graph 2). In 2020, Gauteng's growth rate contracted by 5% due to the pandemic. In the following year, Gauteng recovered from the pandemic and experienced a 5% growth rate. The province recorded a marginal 0.1% growth in 2023.

As of 2023, the real economy, that is, agriculture, mining, manufacturing and construction, in Gauteng accounted for 23% of the provincial GDP compared to 27% at the national level (see Graph 3). However, the share of the real economy in the province declined from 25% in 2010 to 22% in 2020, suggesting a broader trend of deindustrialisation. Manufacturing is the largest real economic sector in Gauteng, accounting for 17% in 2023, down from 19% in 2010. Construction is the second largest real economic sector, making up 2.4% of the province's output, followed by mining with 2.1% and agriculture with 0.6%. While the construction and mining contribution to Gauteng's GDP has declined over the past decade, agriculture output has essentially remained flat.

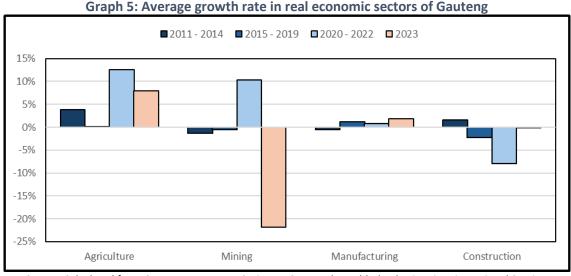
At the manufacturing industry level, the metals industry constitutes the largest share of manufacturing output in Gauteng, accounting for 24%. Petroleum and food and beverages closely follow, accounting for 21% and 20% of manufacturing output. As shown in Graph 4, the food and beverages industry has been the fastest-growing manufacturing industry in the province, with its share of manufacturing output increasing by 9% from 2005 to 20% in 2023.

Graph 4: Manufacturing industries as a percentage share of total manufacturing GVA in Gauteng, 2005 to 2023

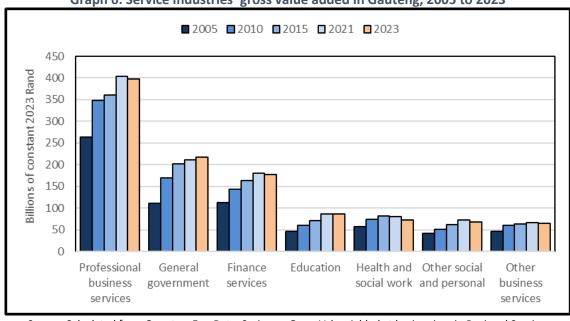

Between 2011 and 2014, agriculture was the fastest-growing real economic sector in Gauteng, with an average growth rate of 4%, while construction grew by 2%. Mining declined by 1.3% while manufacturing declined by 0.6% (see Graph 5). The growth of the real economy in Gauteng was sluggish between 2015 and 2019. Similar to the Free State, agriculture in Gauteng grew by 13%, followed by mining at 10% and manufacturing at 1% between 2020 and 2022. Construction severely declined by 2% during this period, an indication of limited post-pandemic recovery. In 2023, mining declined the most by 22% while construction declined by 0.2%. agriculture grew the most by 8% and manufacturing by 2% in the same period.

Professional business services are the largest contributor to services value added in Gauteng. The industry has experienced significant growth over the years and accounted for R397.5 billion in value-added in 2023 (see Graph 6). General government services, financial services, education, and other social and personal services have grown over the years. Health and social work have experienced moderate growth and declined in 2023.

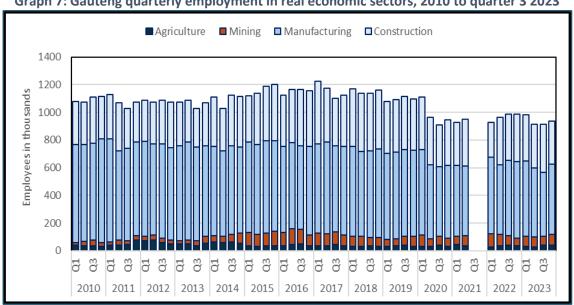


Graph 6: Service industries' gross value added in Gauteng, 2005 to 2023

Employment in real economic sectors

In 2023, Gauteng accounted for 27% of total employment in South Africa, the highest of all provinces (see Graph 7).

Manufacturing remains the highest share of employment in the real economy in the province, with over 502 000 workers in 2023, followed by construction accounting for 328 000 workers. While the overall figure of employment depicts a positive outlook, from 2022 to 2023 the manufacturing sector declined by 7%, and the mining sector by 5%. In contrast, construction employment increased by 3% in 2023 from the previous year, while agricultural employment plateaued at 34 000 in the same period.

Real economy projects

Energy

Gauteng, one of South Africa's largest economic hubs, receives the highest amount of electricity among the provinces. In 2023, the province received 25% of the electricity distributed by Eskom. In 2007, Eskom distributed 66 014 Gigawatt hours (GWh) to the province, which was 28% of the total electricity distributed by the utility that year. Despite maintaining the highest distribution share, the amount of electricity distributed to Gauteng sharply declined to 51 819 in 2023, which was likely because of loadshedding.

Table 1 indicates the IPP projects in Gauteng. Only one project, the Joburg Landfill Gas to Energy Project technology is currently operational. The limited presence of IPP projects highlights a potential area for growth in diversifying the province's energy alternatives.

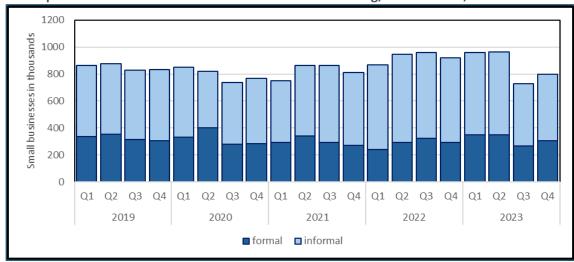

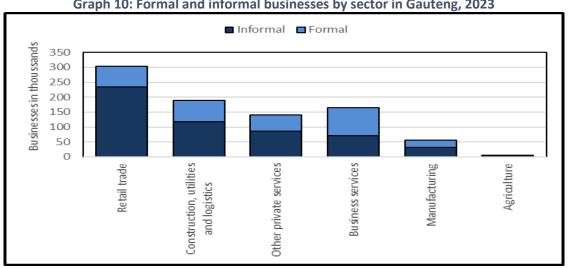
Small business

Gauteng hosts the highest number of small businesses in South Africa, both formal and informal. In the fourth quarter of 2023, the province accounted for 40% of formal small businesses and 28% of small informal businesses (see Graph 9). In Q2 2020, Gauteng had 401 000 formal small businesses, but these sharply declined to 277 000 in Q3 2020 during the pandemic. By Q2 2021, there was a partial recovery to 320 000 formal businesses, but the number declined again to 304 000 in Q4 2023. There were similar fluctuations in the informal sector. Informal small businesses declined from 517 000 in Q1 2020 to 420 000 in Q2 2020, likely due to the pandemic. While formal small businesses declined by 31% in the third quarter of 2020 from the previous quarter, informal small businesses declined by 19% in the second quarter of 2020 from the previous quarter. There was a notable recovery to a peak of 655 000 in Q2 2022, but informal small businesses then declined to 496 000 in Q4 2023. Notably, there is a huge disparity between formal and informal small businesses as informal small businesses dominate in the province. Gauteng had 800 000 small businesses in the fourth quarter of 2023.

Gauteng has a significant number of informal businesses, with substantial operating formally. Retail trade constitutes a significant share of businesses, accounting for 35% of all businesses in the province (see Graph 10). The construction, utilities, and logistics sectors represent the second-largest sector, comprising 22% of total businesses. Business services make up 19%, followed by other private services at 16%, manufacturing at 7%, and agriculture at 1%.

Employment and unemployment

Gauteng has a low level of joblessness compared to the national average. In 2020, the absorption rate was 44%, while the national average was 40%. Although joblessness is still low in Gauteng compared to the national average, it has risen sharply over the past decade, with the absorption rate declining from 51% in 2010 to 45% in 2023. Unemployment in the province has risen over the past decade, with unemployment rates increasing from 27% in 2010 to 34% in 2023.

Economic policy initiatives

This section outlines industrial policy and development initiatives introduced in Gauteng between 2022 and 2024.

- The Industrial Development Corporation's (IDC's) Social Employment Fund created about 2 090 jobs in Gauteng by the second quarter of 2023.
- In 2021/2022, the Department of Trade, Industry and competition (the dtic) approved R4.7 billion for industrial infrastructure projects in Gauteng, aiming to support 11 000 direct jobs. The projects resulted in an actual investment of R21.5 billion.
- The Gauteng Provincial Government with the IDC and SA SME Fund contributed a combined amount of R300 million to the SMME Crisis Partnership Fund meant towards investing in Gauteng-based businesses. A total of 40 000 direct employment opportunities were created in 2022.
- Twelve Gauteng based entities benefited from the dtic's approved R688 million in the Clothing Textile Footwear Leather Growth Programme in the third quarter of 2022.
- The dtic approved R311 million Industrial financing for Gauteng-based projects, this resulted in 1 900 job creation over the 2021/2022 period.
- For the 2021/2022 period, the dtic also approved R4.7 billion through the Industrial Infrastructure finance for projects in Gauteng, leading to 11 000 jobs directly supported.
- In the seven years leading up to 2021/2022, the dtic, IDC, and National Empowerment Fund approved combined funding of R15.8 billion to Gauteng through the Black Industrialist Programme to support spatial socioeconomic development.

Special Economic and Industrial Development Zones

- As of 2024, Gauteng had two designated and/or proposed Industrial Development and Special Economic Zones:
 - Over the 2022/2023 the Tshwane Automotive Special Economic Zone (TASEZ) created 1 100 direct jobs that were created through infrastructure-related projects.
 - Between 2022 and 2023 the Gauteng IDZ integrated 26 students participating in the construction mentorship programme.
 - In the same period, an estimated 132 Small and Medium Micro-Enterprises (SMMEs) benefited from the Gauteng IDZ.

- In the 2022/2023 financial year TASEZ created 3 950 jobs (3 300 in construction and 600 in operational automotive).
- In 2021/2022, the businesses located in the TASEZ managed to attract R3.34 billion in investments from foreign and domestic investors.
- Over the 2022/2023 period, the cumulative investments pledged to the TASEZ stood at R4.6 billion.
- In the same period, the Gauteng Industrial Development Zone in O.R Tambo attracted R1.13 billion in domestic and international investments.

National Spatial Economy

Gauteng is South Africa's most urbanised and industrialised province. In 2023, 97% of households in the province were located in urban areas. The province is home to three metros and two secondary cities, which account for approximately 95% of its population. In 2023, 39% of Gauteng's adult population had a matric certificate and 16% had a post-matric qualification. Regarding infrastructure, 98% of households in Gauteng had piped or tap water in their houses or yards combined in 2023, compared to 87% nationally. In addition, 83% of households had access to electricity compared to 90% nationally.

Provincial Government

The premier of Gauteng is Andrek Panyaza Lesufi, a member of the ANC. Lebohang Maile is the MEC of Finance and Economic Development, while Vuyiswa Ramokgopa is the MEC of Agriculture and Rural Development. Maile represents the ANC and Ramokgopa represents Rise Mzansi.
